





Instead of setting up the instrument hardware, the EasyEXPERT software focuses on the real task at hand for the engineer ---device characterization. All that you need to do is to connect the instrument to the device terminals as shown in the EasyEXPERT test parameters area.

The EasyEXPERT software also provides the classic test mode that allows the 4155/4156 like measurement setup operation and the tracer test mode that suggests the new concept curve tracer operation.




- Step 1: Click Application Test tab.
- Step 2: Select one or more technology categories, and select a desired test from the list of tests associated with the selected technology categories.
- Step 3: Change the setup parameters (Device parameters and Test parameters) if you want.
- Step 4: Connect DUT, and click the Start button. The B1505A starts the selected test.
- Step 5: Analyze the measurement result data displayed on the Data Display window automatically opened after the test.

The measurement result record is automatically stored in the internal hard disk drive when the Auto Recode mode is ON.




The N1258A and N1259A install HPSMU protection adapter and GNDU protection adapter.

The N1259A can be equipped with the module selector, bias-T, and R-box.



The HVSMU and HCSMU can perform the measurements for both force side and compliance side simultaneously. This means that the HVSMU/HCSMU can measure both voltage and current when it performs voltage or current output.

The Force and Compliance Sides measurement mode is not available for the HPSMU.



N1259A test fixture supports the following DUT interface for DUT connection.



Interlock to Prevent Electrical Shock

Voltages greater than 42 V are not allowed when an interlock sense switch is open.


Pinch Point Prevention

Heavily damped lid hinges protect fingers and hands from injury due to the heavy lid suddenly slamming down.




Module selector is used to switch the measurement resource connected to the device under test (DUT) automatically. The measurement resource will be HPSMU, HVSMU, or HCSMU. One selector provides one switching channel.

The N1258A is used with a DUT interface such as your own test fixture and prober station, not N1259A fixture.




The Configuration window Module Selector tab screen is used to specify the input connections and the default setting of the module selector.

The modules connected to the module selector inputs must be specified by the Input fields. And the default setting of the module selector internal switch must be set by the Default field. The default setting means the module selector internal switch connection in the idle state. The switch connection is automatically controlled by the EasyEXPERT software. The connection depends on the measurement module actually used in the test setup.



High voltage bias-T is used to perform the high voltage C-V measurement. The C-V measurement up to 3000 Vdc can be realized by using the bias-T, MFCMU, and HVSMU.

The N1260A is used with a DUT interface such as your own test fixture and prober station, not the N1259A test fixture.



Protection adapter is used for protecting GNDU or HPSMU module from high voltage.

The N1261A is used with a DUT interface such as your own test fixture and prober station, not the N1259A test fixture.

Resistor box is used for reducing the risk of device breakdown or preventing SMU from oscillation. 1 k Ω (\pm 200 Vdc), 1 k Ω (\pm 3000 Vdc), 100 k Ω (\pm 3000 Vdc), or 1 M Ω (\pm 3000 Vdc).


The N1262A is used with a DUT interface such as your own test fixture and prober station, not the N1259A test fixture.




HCSMU adapter is used to convert the HCSMU Force and Sense connectors to the High and Low BNC connectors.

The 16493S is used with a DUT interface such as your own test fixture and prober station, not the N1259A test fixture.





The source monitor unit (SMU) can function in the following modes:

- Voltage source while monitoring current (compliance side measurement)
- Voltage source while monitoring voltage (force side measurement)
- Current source while monitoring current (force side measurement)
- Current source while monitoring voltage (compliance side measurement)


The force side measurement is available for HVSMU and HCSMU. In the GPIB remote mode, it is available for all SMU.

The SMU can output V or I in constant, linear sweep, logarithmic sweep or pulsed modes.

Constant V or I mode could be used for "spot" measurements or biases.

Swept output is used to trace a curve. A second SMU can be swept subordinately to measure a "family of curves."


Pulsed mode is used during swept measurements to reduce the effects of thermal stress on the device under test (DUT).



The SMUs can now sweep up to a value and then back down (double sweep). This feature is useful when the device must be tested without abruptly removing the forcing condition.


Log sweeps are required any time the measurement results span many decades, such as a MOS subthreshold curve.

The variable used to set the SMU to a basic sweep is VAR1. It may be called the primary sweep.



A subordinate sweep variable (VAR2) may be combined with the basic sweep variable (VAR1). This corresponds to the step knob and sweep knob of a curve tracer. This produces a family of curves. VAR2 may be called the secondary sweep.

Another useful combination is a synchronous sweep. Here VAR1 and VAR1' are in-step. VAR1' defaults to a gain of 1, which means it exactly tracks VAR1. You can also vary the initial offset between VAR1 and VAR1'. These features are useful for bipolar gummel plots, op-amp differential input tests, etc.



Before performing measurement, choose appropriate SMU type for connecting to the device terminal.

The above example shows the typical connections for measuring a power MOSFET which has 3 terminals. HPSMU and GNDU are connected to Gate and Source respectively. And HVSMU will be connected to Drain for the high voltage measurement. Or HCSMU High and Low will be connected to Drain and Source respectively for the high current measurement.


Kelvin connection is available for the HPSMU, HCSMU, and GNDU. To make the Kelvin connection, connect the SMU/GNDU Force and Sense terminals together at the point as close as possible to the device terminal. The Kelvin connection is effective for low resistance or high current measurement.







Tracer Test is the best way for performing I-V measurement easily and quickly.

Display the Tracer Test screen and set the measurement condition.

You can finish the setup by the following four steps only.

- 1. Click Add button to add a SMU channel setup line.
- 2. Set the X axis and maximum value.
- 3. Set the Y axis and maximum value.
- 4. Set the NOS and Compliance values.












The Tracer Test setup can be recalled in the Tracer Test mode as shown in the previous page. Also it can be recalled and used in the Classic Test mode.

Change the test mode to Classic Test, and perform the procedure shown in the previous page.

Display the Measurement Setup, Display Setup, and so on. And check the conversion result of the setup data. Also change the setup as you desire. You can set the details of measurement conditions which are not supported by the Tracer Test mode.


This window displays measurement result graph, list, and parameter values.

Markers are used to traverse the actual measurement data. Markers cannot be placed anywhere on the screen except on an actual measurement trace. They are denoted with a small circle. One moves the markers with the front panel rotary pulse generator (RPG) knob, mouse, or touch screen.

Cursor may be used anywhere on the screen and are denoted by a small cross. The cursor is moved using mouse, touch screen, or an arrow key.

The line function may be selected to draw one of four types of lines: line between cursors, gradient line, tangent line, regression line.

One of the most used interactive functions on this window is the autoscale feature which is applied by clicking the icon of yardsticks.




The List Display corresponds exactly with the Graph Plot. Even the highlighted line of data corresponds to the marker position on the Graph Plot.

Up to twenty columns of data can be set on the List Display. Note that the Graph Plot can only plot nine columns (X, Y1 to Y8).


The list data can be copied to a spreadsheet software easily. Click Edit > Copy List. This copies all of the list data into the clipboard.

On the Notepad, paste it and save it as a text file. The file can be opened as a tab separated value data by using a spreadsheet software. See the next page.



You can read the measurement result on a spreadsheet software.

- 1. Click Edit > Copy List on the Data Display window.
- 2. Click Edit > Paste on the Notepad window.
- 3. Save the data as a CSV file.
- 4. Open the CSV file on your spreadsheet software.




Open If-Vf application test in the Power Diode category. This test can be used for resistance measurement.

Set Anode to the available SMU (ex. SMU1:HP) and change VfStop value to 40 V which is the maximum value of this parameter. And execute the measurement. You can see the test result as shown in the next page.


Device Parameters area allows the user to set device parameters. In the If-Vf setup, the device parameter is temperature only.

Extended Setup button opens the Extended Setup dialog box which shows the extra setup parameters. In the If-Vf setup, the extended test parameters are hold time, If zero, measurement time, pulse base value, and pulse averaging count.



Cabling and Fixturing Issues • Guard connection • Kelvin connection • Accessory connection • Connection cables • Interlock function


The B1505A is a precision instrument. However, the ability to make precise and reliable measurements may be compromised by your fixturing to the device. The following section provides some theory and hints for making sense out of cabling and fixturing issues.



The guard connection is needed for the high voltage measurement and the measurement < 1 nA. Below 1 nA a regular coax cable's capacitance dominates over the DUT (device under test) capacitance. What you see is cable charging current. I = C(dv/dt) where dv/dt is the rate of change of SMU voltage from one step to the next of a coax cable with no guard. C is the total capacitance of the cable.


The above diagram shows how the cable capacitance is eliminated with a triaxial cable. The guard is driven at the same voltage as the force center conductor. No current can flow between guard and force when they are held at the same potential. Guard and force are isolated by a buffer amplifier. They can never be shorted together.

The guard is effective for HPSMU and HVSMU.



Shown above are typical capacitance and series resistance of the force line. If cables are too long, high capacitance may cause the SMU to oscillate. Keep the force-guard cable capacitance less than 600 pF. Similarly, the guard-shield capacitance must be less than 5000 pF.

Note the rather high force resistance. Kelvin connections must be used to eliminate this cable error.




The triax cable is a special low dielectric loss, high impedance cable. This cable may be used down to fA levels when properly used with a guarded probe. The guard voltage tracks the force voltage exactly, so that no voltage drop can exist between guard and force. This eliminates the capacitive loading that would otherwise limit low current measurements.

If low impedance coax cables are used with outer layer at ground potential, two limitations will be immediately apparent. The cable leakage will limit the low current measurement floor. In addition, when the voltage is swept, the sudden change will cause additional cable charging. This distorts the low current portion of a MOS subthreshold curve as shown.

RULES:


Unguarded coax cable is OK for measurements above 1 nA.

Triax cable or coax with outer layer at guard potential should be used for measurements below 1 nA.



With the Kelvin connection, sensing is done at the DUT, eliminating the fraction of an ohm of cable resistance. The internal sensing resistor Rs is the only feedback path without the Kelvin connection.

Note that the B1505A operates just fine without the sense cable. This is important to know because in general you do not need the sensing Kelvin connection. Most MOS measurements are high impedance and the residual cable loss is insignificant.



The triaxial cables are good for low current measurements. However, two cables are necessary for low resistance Kelvin measurements.


Keysight Technologies designed a special Kelvin triaxial cable for the precision semiconductor parameter analyzers. This cable is optimized for both low current and low resistance measurement. Both force and sense lines are held rigidly in the same PTFE cable. Friction is reduced and the cable is less sensitive to noise caused by moving the cable. This cable can be used for connecting the HPSMU installed in the B1505A.

Kelvin triaxial cable assemblies are available with two connector options:

16494B B1500A/4156 compatible on one end; 4142 compatible on the other end


16493K B1500A/4156 compatible on both ends (standard option)

For connecting the HCSMU and HVSMU, use 16493S and 16493T respectively.



In the example above, the device is connected with a SMU on the base sweeping current, a voltmeter on the collector, and the emitter is grounded with a Kelvin SMU. The base SMU does not have to be Kelvin since we are only forcing current and do not care about measuring the cable loss in the base. Also, the collector SMU is being used only as a high impedance voltmeter, so there is no cable loss in this lead.


The emitter on the other hand, must be connected to a Kelvin SMU. Because of this, we can compensate for the Rcable ohm path through the cable and fixture. From the graph we can see the emitter resistance is Re ohm when compensated using the Kelvin connection. Non-Kelvin resistance is Re+Rcable ohm, due to the extra Rcable ohm cable and fixture resistance error.




This is the image of measurement setup. The B1505A can be connected to several accessories as shown. The accessories can be connected to the B1505A directly by using the dedicated cables.

Consult your prober vendor for the accessory installation and connections. Special cables and handling will be required to make the connections between the accessories and the DUT interface. They will differ by each prober.

Interlock circuit must be installed in the shielding box of the DUT interface. And it must be connected to the B1505A interlock connector. The interlock circuit is required when the voltage exceeds 42 V or when the program memory is used in a control program.



The high voltage bias-T is required for the up to 3000 V high voltage C-V measurement. The B1505A and DUT should be connected as shown.



The 16493S-010 HCSMU Kelvin adapter converts the HCSMU connectors to four BNC connectors High Sense, High Force, Low Sense, and Low Force. This adapter must be used for the high current measurement to reduce the effect of the residual resistance.


The GNDU Force and Sense must be connected to the device low terminal. Then use a BNC-T adapter, two BNC cables, and N1254A-503 or other cable. To extend the accurate 0 V point as close as possible to the device terminal, extend the GNDU Kelvin connection to the device terminal.

If you want to simplify the connections, prepare the following parts instead of the parts between the N1261A-002 and the device shown above.


Two BNC(m)-(f)-(f) adapters to be directly connected to the 16493S Low Force and Sense.

Two BNC cables to be connected between the N1261A Force/Sense and the 16493S Low Force/Sense.

This connection can save one probing pin or needle for the GNDU and can make the connection easy. However it may cause small noise on the measurement result.



If the additional HCSMU is used for the measurement of the low current terminal such as MOSFET Gate, the 16493S-011 HCSMU Non-Kelvin adapter can be used instead of the 16493S-010 Kelvin adapter. The Non-Kelvin adapter converts the HCSMU connectors to two BNC connectors High and Low.




The module selector is used for the automatic switching of the measurement resources connected to DUT. The measurement resources are the HPSMU, HVSMU, HCSMU, and GNDU.

The module selector Low Sense and Force are internally connected to the HCSMU Low Sense and Force respectively also the Low Sense is connected to both GNDU Sense and Force. And the High Sense and Force connections are switched.


The module selector requires the AC power and the control signal via the B1505A Digital I/O connector.

The module selector installs the HPSMU protection adapter and the GNDU protection adapter.




For the measurement using the module selector, the GNDU can be connected to the module selector GNDU input. This connection is especially effective for the measurement using the HCSMU because it makes cabling easy although it ends the Kelvin connection of GNDU in the module selector. This is no problem for the measurement with the HCSMU as no current flows to the GNDU.

This connection is also available for the measurement using the HPSMU or the HVSMU. However for the accurate measurement over 10 mA, use the N1261A-002/004 GNDU protection adapter to extend the Kelvin connection as close as possible to the device terminal.



To make complete dark condition in the prober shielding box, the status indicator must be OFF. The Power LED and Status indicator are disabled by setting Status LED to OFF on the Configuration window Module Selector tab screen.



To prevent shock hazard, the B1505A will not operate above 42 V, unless you connect the interlock circuit.

The interlock connection is required when the voltage exceeds 42 V or when the program memory is used in a control program.

The N1259A test fixture has the interlock circuit internally which makes this short by closing a lid activated switch.

You must make the circuit to your prober to comply with US OSHA safety standards. The switch on the prober should be mounted into the access door of the shield box.

SHV connectors are opposite male/female against the BNC, and it is easy to see incompatibility with others.

MHV connectors are similar to BNC connectors, and are often mistaken to be BNC connectors.


To connect the HVSMU, the SHV connector must be used. The other connectors do not support up to $3000\ V.$






The HVSMU and HCSMU output can be limited by using the Configuration window SMU Output Setting Limits tab screen. This is effective for preventing the probe tip from burning out.

High Current SMU


The above example shows the typical connections for measuring a power bipolar junction transistor which has 3 terminals. HPSMU and GNDU are connected to Base and Emitter respectively. And HCSMU High and Low will be connected to Collector and Emitter respectively for the high current measurement.

Kelvin connection is available for the HPSMU, HCSMU, and GNDU. To make the Kelvin connection, connect the Force and Sense terminals together at the point as close as possible to the device terminal. The Kelvin connection is effective for low resistance or high current measurement.

Generally, any mutual inductance, interference of the measurement signals, and unwanted residual factors in the connection method incidental to ordinary termination methods will have significant effects on the measurements, especially at a high frequency. The MFCMU employs the four-terminal pair (4TP) measurement configuration which permits easy, stable, and accurate measurements and avoids the measurement limitations inherent to such factors.


The above figure shows the four-terminal pair measurement principle. The measurement terminals consist of the following four coaxial connectors.

-Hcur: High current -Hpot: High potential -Lpot: Low potential -Lcur: Low current



MFCMU supports the linear single sweep and the linear double sweep. The MFCMU can sweep up to a value and then back down (double sweep). This feature is useful when the device must be tested without abruptly removing the forcing condition.

The MFCMU can force up to 25~V DC bias. The DC bias can be expanded up to 3000~V by using the HVSMU and the high voltage Bias-T.




The above example shows the connections for measuring a power MOSFET Cds-Vds characteristics. MFCMU and HVSMU are connected to the high voltage bias-T as shown. And High, Low, and AC Guard are connected to Drain, Source, and Gate respectively.





MFCMU is equipped with the error correction function used to realize accurate impedance measurements. The correction function minimizes the effects of the error elements in the extension cables and the DUT interface such as manipulator and probe card.


At least perform the phase compensation and the open correction. They only need to open the measurement terminals.

Performing the short correction and the load correction is recommended.

If it is easy to make the short condition in your test environment, perform the short correction.

If you have the load standard, perform the load correction.

The standard must have the reference value. And the reference value must be defined in the Advanced Options for CMU Calibration window. This window is opened by clicking the Advanced Options... button. See the next page.



Open the Calibration window and click the CMU Calibration tab to perform the CMU calibration.

At first, open the MFCMU high and low terminals at the device end (socket), and perform the Phase Compensation by clicking the Measure... button.


After the phase compensation, perform the Open Correction by clicking the Measure... button.

If you can make the short condition, short the measurement terminals, and perform the Short Correction.

If you have the load standard, connect it, and perform the Load Correction.

Note:

If you use the calibration standard, define the reference data before starting the calibration. It must be defined in the Reference Standard Value on the Advanced Options for CMU Calibration window.



Perform measurement. The Data Display window will show the measurement result as shown in this example.
